Notes from the HOA Annual meeting –

Our 2024 annual homeowners meeting was held on February 20. Forty-seven homeowners were present in person or by proxy. Brian Langfitt and Todd Sanders were elected as Directors. The annual budget was approved, with each lot assessment remaining at \$580, which brings our reserve fund total to \$9000. The Board was directed to develop and propose a recommended reserve fund strategy and amount prior to the 2025 annual meeting.

Our Natural Area Update

Our subdivision has qualified to participate in the Firewise Program which involves the fire mitigation work being done in the 7-acre Natural Area as well as various community outreach projects. The goals for our Natural Area are to mitigate fire hazards, to benefit wildlife, and to provide a safe and usable natural area for residents to enjoy. We received a grant of \$8000, matched in part by our HOA, to begin the work of clearing a fire break and creating corridors through stands of trees and shrubs. This initial phase of work commenced in February and was completed by late March.

Work party for Natural Area

At some point in the near future, we need volunteers to help enhance the trails in the 7-acre Natural Area. The crews have cleared out the firebreak along the fence lines and cut three main access routes through the Russian olive stands. Wood chips from the cleared areas were spread over the access routes to help cover the ruts made during clearing. The work crews have left us several additional piles of wood chips that we need to spread out along the main trails. We need people with wheelbarrows, rakes, shovels, and lots of elbow grease for a few hours one weekend to get this done. Date to be announced!

Give Input to Sustainability Grand Junction

The City of Grand Junction will host a bilingual Sustainability and Adaptation open house on April 21, 2024, at the Lincoln Park Barn from 1-3 p.m. for community members to learn more about the draft Sustainability and Adaptation Plan (SAP) and provide input on strategies for each focus area.

Goals, strategies, and actions have been identified in each of five focus areas to help the city reach targets to improve environmental, social, and economic sustainability. Example goals from the plan include 1) Improve Access to Food, 2) Maintain Good Air Quality, 3) Support Carbon Reducing Energy Initiatives, 4) Reduce Waste to the Landfill, and 5) Reduce Water Consumption from Landscape and Irrigation. This will be an interactive and family-friendly event where participants can provide input on the plan. Staff will be present to answer any questions. The community can also provide input on the draft plan online through Engagegj.org during the comment period from Friday, April 19 through Friday, May 17.

Yard Care Tips by Bob Mohler

Our local expert, Bob has kindly written tips for each season which are available in our enews archive

This issue, the focus is on Japanese Beetle infestation.

Japanese Beetles (Popillia japonica Newman) was discovered in Grand Junction in the summer of 2022 with last year's general infestation being 24 Road and Horizon Drive between G Road and H Road.



Japanese beetle larvae feed on roots of irrigated grasses such as Kentucky bluegrass, ryegrass and fescue as these are their preferred turf for egg laying. Japanese beetles are polyphagous (feeding on a variety of plants) and as such pose a threat to the agriculture in this area, especially fruit trees such as peaches and pears, but also the adults will feed on roses and other ornamentals (even potted plants) as well as vegetable crops.

Because of these threats, Mesa County has also asked local residents to aid in controlling the Japanese beetle through treatment of their lawns. To control these pests, use a product such as GrubEX (a Scott's product) available at box stores such as Home Depot. Apply in the spring (April) per directions on the package to kill the grubs/larva. Ads for this



product state that it is not only good for controlling the larvae of Japanese beetles, but also European chafers, Green June beetles and other grubs for up to four months. The adults of the Japanese beetle are most abundant in early summer (from late June through August) so an April application of GrubEX should suffice.

DRC Design Review Committee

This is who approves changes in your landscape, exteriors of you property. They approve concept, drainage, fencing, shed, trees, and solar piping color. For example, some lots drain to front, some to back or front and others to the back. If drainage is blocked or improper it can cause pooling of water.
