Why Close the Natural Area in the Spring? By Neighbor Bob Moehler

Visitors to our Granite Falls Natural Area have most likely noticed the sign closing the area to dogs basically through the spring season. One reason for this is that this is a time of nesting for ground nesting birds such as the western meadowlark and the Gambel's quail, both which inhabit our Natural Area. Descriptions of both are below via Wikipedia. Note: both birds can breed into July.



The western meadowlark (Sturnella neglecta) is a medium-sized icterid bird, about 8.5 inches in length. It nests on the ground in open grasslands across western and central North America. It feeds mostly on bugs but will also feed on seeds and berries.

Gambel's quail (Callipepla gambelii) is a small ground-dwelling bird in the New World quail family. It inhabits the desert regions of Arizona, California, Colorado, New Mexico, Nevada, Utah, Texas, and Sonora; also New Mexico-border Chihuahua and the Colorado River region of Baja California and are often abundant near desert streams, such as the one in our Natural Area.



Local Fun for 4th of July

***Colorado National Monument - Early morning, 4th of July, Colorado National Monument, Flag raising on top of Independence Monument

John Otto could think of nothing better than to advertise Monument Canyon from a flag waving on top of the 450-foot tall Independence Monument. He worked day after day for several weeks pounding iron pipes and carving out footsteps into solid rock to make it possible for any brave soul to get to the top. After successfully getting to the top of Independence Monument for the first time on June 8, 1911, John Otto started his tradition of raising an American flag on top of Independence Monument every year on the Fourth of July.

Today, the Mesa County Technical Rescue Team climbs and raises the American flag just like John Otto did 101 years ago.

Fruita fireworks are Wednesday, July 3, launched from James M. Robb State Park around sunset. Snooks Bottom Open Space will be closed to the public all day Wednesday. Residents should expect traffic impacts around Fruita that day and plan accordingly, according to the city of Fruita.

Highway 340 southbound going toward Colorado National Monument will be closed for the show, and traffic will be directed northbound toward I-70, the I-70 Frontage Road and Aspen Avenue. High traffic volume can be expected at the entrance to James M. Robb State Park, Jurassic Avenue and Raptor Road.

Removing Noxious Russian Olive Trees By Neighbor Jenni Dixon

Did you know the Russian Olives we have growing in the natural area are actually on the Colorado noxious weed list as a class B noxious weed?

What is so bad about this tree? They are highly invasive. Russian-olive trees are a thorny, hard-wood tree that easily takes over riparian (river bank) corridors, choking out native cottonwoods, box elders, and willows. They out-compete other native vegetation, interfering with natural plant succession. These trees can be such an entangled mess they also interfere with creeks and canals impacting stream flow.

The tree can reach up to 30 feet with branches that have 1 to 2inch thorns and will block the view of the monument as well as make walking through the natural area difficult for people and dogs.

To remove Russian olive trees you cannot just cut them down, but must apply an herbicide immediately afterwards to kill the roots.

Lawn Watering Tips

- Here are a few lawn watering tips for our climate and soils.
- Water as deeply and as infrequently as possible. This promotes deep roots.
- Apply 1 to 1.5 inches of water per application, total 2-3 inches per week. (Set out a few flat-bottom containers to measure.)
- The best time to water is between 10 pm and 6 am.
- If you have runoff, cycle your watering with shorter times. Example two 15 min intervals spaced 30 min apart instead of one 30 min interval.
- A lawn cut at 3 inches will retain more water than a lawn cut at 2 inches.
- Aerate your lawn in the Spring
- Fertilize your lawn three times per year (March/April, late June, September)

HOA News

Hello Friends and Neighbors

I would like to take this time to update all of you as to what your hard-working, dedicated HOA board has been up to recently. This will be the first part in a series of articles. First off, the three major responsibilities that an HOA board is tasked with are:

- 1. Maintain common area elements of the community.
- 2. Ensure compliance with governing documents.
- 3. Conduct the financial business of the association

To fulfill the first item, we have several sub-committees to assist us. There is an architectural control committee (ACC), a design review committee (DRC), and beautification/natural area committees. Other committees work on the irrigation system, prepare newsletters, and keep the website up to date. The second issue falls to the ACC and the DRC. The ACC is tasked with making sure the builders submit an approved set of plans prior to breaking ground. This ensures that a number of items (soil tests, engineered foundations, size of house, exterior colors, setbacks from property lines, etc.) are all in accordance with building department and developer guidelines. This helps ensure the overall quality of the houses in our beautiful Granite Falls neighborhood.

The DRC assists builders and homeowners know and follow the guidelines as set forth in the Design Review Guidelines (DRG) and the Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions (CC&R) documents. These documents are a combination of city and county rules as well as items that the developer wanted included to complete their vision of the property. These documents were in place before the first shovel of dirt was dug to start Granite Falls. It is the responsibility of the builders as well as all of us homeowners to be familiar with and follow all these rules. You

should have been presented with a copy of all of these documents prior to purchasing your home. We also list them on our Granite Falls website if you need to reread them.

Some of the items the board hears about are RVs not parked correctly, cars and RVs parked on gravel areas, cars and RVs parked on City streets for longer than 72 hours, roof vents and conduit not painted to match the roof, and improper storage sheds, to name a few. The storage of RVs was implemented by the developer to allow people with RVs to store t hem but in a way to lessen their visual impact. The painting of vents and proper storage sheds was also added to protect the visual quality of the neighborhood. The other items listed are City rules and can be enforced by City employees.

Another issue is making sure that all exterior lighting shines vertically and not horizontally (except for motion activated security lighting). This was put in place to protect the serenity of the neighbors while also helping preserve the night sky. This committee is also where you need to submit any landscaping plans or changes to your plans.

Next time I'll continue telling you about other committees as well as discuss the other major tasks your HOA board is responsible for.
